The United Irish of Dayton Celtic Festival, presented by the United Irish of Dayton in partnership with Five Rivers MetroParks, returns July 26-28 at RiverScape MetroPark in Downtown Dayton. The festival will take place, rain or shine. Admission is FREE, and plenty of shaded seating is available! Festival hours are 5:30-11 pm on Friday, July 26; 11:30 am-11 pm on Saturday, July 27th; and 9 am-6 pm on Sunday, July 28th.

The festival features a dynamic cultural area, with many exhibits to enhance festival goers' knowledge of Celtic history, language, music, and other cultural topics, including several activities for children. The workshops will take place at two tents with shaded seating.

One returning favorite is the Irish Wolfhounds in Legend and Lore, presented by the Cú & Craic Irish Wolfhound Club. The Irish wolfhound is the world's tallest breed of dog. Once prized as the war dog of the Celts, this canine is now known as the gentle giant. It was the dog of royalty in medieval times. During the Celtic Revival, the wolfhound became a symbol of Irish nationalism.

In addition, festival goers will be able to participate in workshops on topics such as Irish Language, Legends of St. Brigid, Clogging and Irish influence on American Appalachian Culture, as well as various workshops on Celtic music, use of Celtic musical instruments, and dancing. Participants will be informed on such topics as the difference between jigs and reels, and the names and origins of various instruments. The festival will also feature workshops on Introduction to Irish Bouzouki, Irish Uillean Pipes, and Irish Banjo, along with a session with the Scottish Dancers.

The festival will also include a returning session on The Sport of Hurling (the National Sport of Ireland): 3000 years of tradition and passion by Greg Bebbington of Cleveland Hurling. In addition, children and families will experience workshops on Irish storytelling and making St. Brigid Crosses.
